

IMPACT OF FUNDING LEVELS ON TRANSPORTATION PROGRAMS

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Challenges

- \$296 Billion Projected Ten-Year Funding Gap (2011 CTC Needs Assessment)
- Prop 1B is Over
- Decline of Gas Tax Revenues and Purchasing Power
- Diversion of Transportation Revenues
- Lack of State and Federal Solutions



STATE TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

- Biennial five-year program for state highway improvements, intercity rail, and regional highway and transit improvements
- Funding: 44% of price based excise tax

2015-16 Prior	2015-16 Adjusted	Estimated
Estimated Revenue	Estimated Revenue	Shortfall
\$679 million	\$204 million	\$475 million

Consequences:

- Allocation Plan prioritize projects for allocation
- Increased costs for delayed projects
- No new capacity for programming in the 2016 STIP



STATE HIGHWAY OPERATIONS and PROTECTION PROGRAM

• Biennial four-year program to maintain and preserve state highway system (Fix It First Investments)

SHOPP Programming Capacity per year	SHOPP Annual Need	Annual Shortfall
\$2.3 billion	\$8.2 billion	\$5.9 billion

Consequences:

- Continued deterioration of state highway system
- Increased cost due to deferred maintenance and preservation



TRAFFIC CONGESTION RELIEF PROGRAM

- Traffic Congestion Relief Act of 2000 committed \$4.909 billion to 141 specific project designated in law
- Amounts available for TCRP delayed by loans to General Fund

Outstanding Loan Balance	To be Repaid in 2015-16	No Statutory Repayment Schedule
\$565 million	\$83 million	\$482 million

Consequences:

- 37 projects have not yet received any allocation
- 9 of the 37 projects have been completed and agencies await reimbursement
- Increased costs for delayed projects



Revenue

Near-Term Solutions

- Redirection of Truck Weight Fees
- Adjust & Index Excise Tax for Inflation
- Early Loan Repayments
- Cap & Trade

Long-Term Sustainable Solutions

- Road Charge Program (SB 1077)
- Congestion Pricing/Tolling
- P3s Extend deadline for approval



Road Charge Program

Senate Bill 1077

- Signed into law in September 2014
- Mandates:
 - Creation of a Road Charge Technical Advisory Committee
 - To study road charge <u>alternatives</u> to the gas tax.
 - Gather public comment on issues and concerns related to the pilot program - consulting with specified entities to consider certain factors in carrying out its duties.
 - Make recommendations to the Transportation Agency on the design of a pilot program and criteria to be used to evaluate the pilot program.



Road Charge Program

Road Usage Charge Activity Timeline **Demonstration** Live Development Demonstration January 2016 January 2017 **Technical Advisory** Final Report to Committee Kickoff Legislature January 2015 June 2018 Exploration of the potential for RUC in California will take several years, beginning with a preliminary investigation and feasibility analysis, which is currently underway. Under **Preliminary** SB 1077 a Demonstration Rrogram will begin by January 2017 **Future** Investigation and a final report will be completed by June 2018. Full Legislation January 2014 TBD implementation would require future legislation.
